Don't worry, it isn't as confusing as it looks.Â They are defensive structures enclosing high places with rings of ditches and banks. Often there were wooden or stone walls atop the banks as a further barrier. In some cases a series of concentric ditches and banks were built.

The stones make a distinctive circle with space for an entrance, but its purpose remains a mystery. Local legend says the stones were erected to trap an evil witch who was cemented in the middle. A lot of stone circles and megalithic tombs in Ireland were buried within a couple of thousand years of their being built by peat bogs. Some of these have been discovered through peat-cutting, like the impressive Beaghmore complex in County Tyrone.
