Despite the fact that in Chicana/o literature food takes on discursive and affective significance by constructing identity, little attention has been paid to this rich symbol in Chicana/o literary studies. Although its origins can be traced back to the sixteenth century, the bulk of Chicano literature dates from after the 1848 United States annexation of large parts of Mexico in the wake of the Mexican-American War. Today, this genre includes a vibrant and diverse set of narratives, prompting critics to describe it as providing "a new awareness of the historical and cultural independence of
